NOTE FROM OUR PASTOR



Weaving the Divine Thread

I truly believe that God is present to us every minute of every day, yet we struggle to see or feel his presence. It seems that our modern lifestyle, with its busyness and instant access to so much information from the internet, makes it even more difficult to see and experience God in our lives. We are in constant "over stimulation" mode bombarded by so many sounds and noises, each distracting us from seeing God in our lives. Coming to Church each Sunday affords us the opportunity to tune out the noise of the world and allow God to speak to the human heart.



It is the role of the priest to connect God's word to the daily life of the hearer of the Word at Mass. Most Sundays, my homily starts with a story that breaks open the scripture readings. Often the story is an experience of lived faith that I have witnessed during the week. Then I connect it to God's story and hear some challenge from God for all us to live throughout the week ahead.

I believe that God's ways are mysterious yet knowable, hidden yet understandable, and divine yet human. But we need to take the time to listen to him speak through the daily events of our lives. We need to stand back a little from our daily life to see the "pattern" that God is weaving through our lives.


Many of you have asked over the years if I plan to publish another series of books of homilies. I had published my last series, Seeds for the Soul (Cycle A, B, C) over 10 years ago. Finally, with the help of some parishioners, I have published the first in a series of three books of homilies. It is called *Weaving a Divine Thread, Cycle A*.

The title of the book was inspired by the tapestries from the Cathedral of Angels in Los Angeles by artist John Nava. The tapestries are the largest collection hanging in a Catholic place of worship in the United States. Nava combined digital imaging and "Old Master" methods in creating the saints for the tapestries. He weaved the tapestry *Communion of Saints* consisting of females and males of all ages, races, occupations and vocations the world over. Saints from the Renaissance are intermingled with people from the 1st century and the 20th century. This was my inspiration for the name of the book as I believe when I preach I am threading the Word of God and intermingling it with the stories of people's lives from centuries past and to the 21st century.

My hope is that these woven stories will help people to find a place in their soul to weave the Word of God and to trust that the Lord is weaving a divine story deep within them. I have **signed copies** available after all Masses this weekend or in the parish office any time. The **cost is \$15**. It is also available online at Amazon at the same cost **or as an eBook at \$5** but obviously not signed. I hope you can give a gift to someone and I pray that they see the divine thread that God is weaving throughout their lives.

Answering the Call - Vocation to Priesthood By the Diocese of San Jose

Becoming a priest or religious is not primarily our own decision. Rather, it is the response to a call and to a call of love.

—Pope Francis

The word "vocation" comes from the Latin "vocare," meaning "to call". We are all called by God to make a gift of ourselves for God's glory and the salvation of souls. Our vocation is that path to holiness. Some are called to the vocation of marriage, some to consecrated life and others to the priesthood or religious life.

Most of us who have ever wondered if a vocation to priesthood or religious life was for us must have asked the question, "How will I know?" It comes in many forms. "What is God's will in my life?" "How do I find happiness and fulfillment in my life?" "What is the ultimate purpose of my existence?" "How will I know that God is calling me to live the religious life as a priest, brother, or sister?" You must pray every day, asking God to reveal His plan for you. Do not ask yourself "What do I want to do with my life?" This is the wrong question! Rather, you should be thinking and asking, "Jesus what do you want me to be? How do you want me to love You?" And listen for the answer! Listen with your heart, not just your head.

Discernment, i.e. listening with the heart, is prayerfully seeking God's will in your life. It takes time, patience and a willing heart, humility and trust that God does indeed wants what is best for you. There are three keys for discernment: prayer, spiritual direction and support about your questions and concerns. Explore the possibilities by speaking to vocation directors, or attending discernment retreats. Give God a chance, He might be calling you. Don't wait, make the first step now.


Stanford Blood Drive

FAITH FORMATION

Dulce Lopes Pontes

She was born Maria Rita, in Salvador de Bahia in




1914. When she was 13, she went to visit one of the poorest areas of the city. Maria Rita was so struck by what she saw that she began dedicating herself to the poor and needy.

Maria Rita was devoted to St. Therese of the Child Jesus and felt a strong calling to religious life. She said she was ready to perform the "small acts of love" that Jesus transforms into great works.

After entering the Congregation of the Missionary Sisters of the Immaculate Conception of the Mother of God, she became Sister Dulce, and spent time attending to the local poor and destitute.

As Sister Dulce's reputation grew, so did the number of people seeking her help. She started out housing them in abandoned buildings in a rundown area of Bahia,. After a series of evictions, Sister Dulce's Superior said she could use the henhouse attached to the convent, on condition she took care of the chickens. She did: by feeding them to her sick patients. That chicken coop was later to become the Santo Antonio Hospital, a 1500-bed health care centre specializing in cancer treatment.

Sister Dulce developed respiratory problems and had to spend 16 months in that hospital. It was there that Pope John Paul II came to visit her while he was on a trip to Brazil. The President of Brazil nominated her for the 1988 Nobel Peace Prize, in recognition of her work with the Charitable Works Foundation of Sister Dulce, which she founded in 1959.

5 Steps to Spiritual Fitness

January is a common month for setting resolutions for all kinds of self-improvement. Saint Paul writes, "Train yourself to be godly. For physical training is of some value, but godliness has value for all things, holding promise for both the present life and the life to come" (1 Timothy 4:7-8). These five steps may help you grow spiritually stronger:

1. Find encouragement.

Christian community is important because we are "mutually encouraged by each other's faith" (Romans 1:12). Talk more with your faith friends in order to grow.

2. Pray for a larger comfort zone.

If our entire world consists of people just like us, chances are that we're more focused on feeling safe than on sharing the Gospel. Our light can only shine if we interact, on a significant level, with people who are different.

3. Warm up your faith muscles.

To be on fire for God requires stoking our spirit with the fuel of daily prayer. Ask God to give you love that "burns like blazing fire, like a mighty flame" (Song of Solomon 8:6).

4. Get moving!

Vibrant faith doesn't come to those who wait idly, expecting God to turn up the flame. Somewhere in our lives there is a person who is hungry and needs to eat, thirsty and in need of a drink; a stranger
