What can I do or give up to follow Jesus more closely?

NOTE FROM OUR PASTOR



Jesus asks his disciples in today's gospel, "Who do people say that I am?" The disciples responded with what they have heard and the responses are many. After being asked a second time of who they thought he was, Peter makes the powerful testimony, "You are the Christ, son of the living God." He gives witness to Christ because it was revealed to him by God. He had experienced Christ as the Messiah. He

experienced his love firsthand. He "knew" Jesus was God made flesh. The rest of Peter's life is spent working out what that meant for him. There were times that he doubted and turned away. But we know that Peter always turned back. He always came back to Christ and to God.

As disciples of Christ, we believe Jesus is the Son of the living God, too. We claim that testimony every weekend when we recite the creed. We, too, have to spend the rest of our lives working out what that really means for us. There are also times in our lives that we doubt and fall away. But we, too, must remember, like Peter, to always turn back to Christ. We need to always return back to professing, "Christ, you are the son of the living God. You are the Messiah."

There are times that are more defining that others. There are times when it will cost us something to stand up and claim Christ as our savior. It might cost us a friendship of someone who we love but they really cannot stand that we are Catholic or even Christian. We need really to talk about it but leave it in the background for the sake of harmony. There are other times when our political views push to the front of our lives and our religious beliefs take a back seat. When we decide to have our faith on the front burner, decide to lead with our faith, we take a risk and it can cost us seriously.


We are at one of those moments as a nation. When hatred of others because of the color of their skin is held up as an ideal, we cannot remain silent. When people espouse violence to bring such bigotry about, we have to stand up, act up and speak out. It is not enough to remain in the background. Who do people say that we are as Catholics, or as Christians? We need to stand up and be counted as a strong and loud voice against racism.

Like no other time in modern history, we cannot equivocate. We need to raise our voices against white supremacists, Neo-Nazis and KKK. Maybe we cannot agree on other religious views or how those views inform our political views, but together let nobody divide us on this one tenant. Racism is wrong. White Supremacists are wrong. Neo-Nazis are wrong. KKK are wrong. We will not remain quiet. We will not give them the same space as if their voice has any moral equivalence to the truth. We stand united against hatred and violence of all forms. We will stand against racism. Who do people say we are? We are Christians who do not condone hatred or violence. We will stand together against white supremacists, neo-Nazi's and the KKK.

The Rites of the Catholic Church

Every Sunday at Mass, we pray the Creed. One of the statements is I believe in one, holy, catholic and apostolic Church. There is only one Catholic Church under the guidance of the pope. Within that scope of Church, there are multiple rites. We speak of them as many churches, but they are all part of the one Catholic Church. According to the Constitution on the Church, the Catholic Church is understood to be "a corporate body of Churches," united with the bishop of Rome, who serves as the guardian of unity.

When Christ founded His Church, he sent out the apostles to go out into the world to preach and baptize. The apostles did that and traveled throughout the world preaching and teaching. In the first century, there were three major cultural centers of the western world. These centers were Rome, Antioch (Syria), and Alexandria (Egypt). The early Church evangelized in all of these centers. Each center had a unique culture, language and customs. The apostles brought the



Gospel message to these centers and the essential elements of religious practices were brought into those cultures and absorbed by those cultures. This way, the symbols and rituals of the faith became meaningful to that culture. In the fourth century, the Byzantine Empire grew and became another cultural center. What developed over the years was a Western Church centered on Rome and an Eastern Church centered on the other areas.

A rite represents the formal procedures and traditions about how the sacraments are to be celebrated. The churches in these centers developed their own liturgical practices and the rites. The largest rite in the Catholic Church is the Latin or Roman rite. That's why we are called Roman Catholic. The largest of the eastern rites is the Byzantine Rite. Over all there are over 20 liturgical rites present in the Eastern Church today. All of the rites are in full communion with Rome. They each celebrate the liturgy within their local cultures. They have their own organizational structures. They are generally organized under a Patriarch, who together with the bishops and other clergy oversee their Church. Overall they are subject to the pope in Rome.

One of the differences in these rites is that some of the Eastern Rite Churches allow priests to get married. The word "catholic" means universal. Our Catholic Church is truly universal since it unites so many diverse rites whose members share a common faith.

Survival Sacks



Holy Spirit parishioners are continuing to volunteer to distribute Survival Sacks at Sacred Heart Community Center. We gather on the first and third Thursdays of the month to distribute Survival Sacks, organize supplies, make hygiene kits, and fill backpacks. Sacks are distributed to those who are homeless and living on the streets of San Jose,

usually about 50 on each distribution day. We have the privilege of looking for the face of Christ in each of our clients.

Sacred Heart corporate sponsors continue to support our work. Motorola and Starbucks (stores at Alma and Monterey and at Curtner and Old Almaden Road) have provided coffee and Survival Sack supplies. Also, several Catholic High Schools and churches within the Diocese (e.g. Presentation, Mitty, and Queen of Apostles) have contributed hygiene kits, backpacks, underwear, and socks. We thank each and every group for their support.

What is Catechesis?



"Catechesis is nothing other than the process of

transmitting the Gospel, as the Christian community has received it, understands it, celebrates it, lives it and communicates it in many ways." (General Directory for Catechesis #105)

The great commission has been handed to women and men, whom God has called, to proclaim the Good News. This ministry of teaching and forming has traditionally been referred to as catechesis.

The word catechesis comes from the Greek meaning "to echo the teaching" meaning that catechesis or the teaching of the faith is an interactive process in which the Word of God re-sounds between and among the proclaimer, the one receiving the message, and the Holy Spirit! Catechesis is a life-long process of initial conversion, formation, education, and on-going conversion. Through word, worship, service and community, it seeks to lead all God's people to an ever deepening relationship with God who reveals himself in Jesus Christ through the power of the Holy Spirit. Catechesis takes many forms and includes the initiation of adults. vouth and children as well as the intentional and systematic effort to enable all to grow in faith and discipleship.
