A Month of Repentance

The bishop has designated October as a month of repentance at every parish in the Diocese. We will modify our Sunday liturgies as follows:

- The church environment will be simplified like Lent and purple vestments will be used, the color of repentance.
- Fr. Brendan and Fr. Edgar will not wear any vestment at all during Mass but instead lay the vestment over the presider's chair. They will wear only the stole for Mass and sit in a chair beside the presider's chair as a symbol of humility.
- We will not sing an opening song but use the sound bowl as we process.
- The presider will also prostrate fully before the altar asking for forgiveness for the sins of our brother-priests and our bishops.
- We will have special prayers throughout the liturgy for forgiveness and healing.
- Fr. Edgar will lead an adoration prayer service every Friday from 7:00-8:00 p.m.
- The priests will also fast one day each week in repentance.

NOTE FROM OUR PASTOR

Jesus is famous for his powerful parables throughout the gospels and rightly so. They give us a way to understand how God works in our lives through the power of story which is more timeless than any instruction. But the way he handles dissenters is even more powerful. Jesus always does the same thing when one of his detractors comes up with a question to try to stump him. *He reframes the question.*

Today's gospel is a great example of this as the Pharisees asked him, "Is it lawful for a husband to divorce his wife?" Jesus pushes back asking them, "What did Moses command you?" In other words, what did the law command you? This was a rhetorical question for Jesus knew the law inside and out and did not need to ask them. But he was beginning his reframing. He points them back to the law because the spirit of the law was always more important than the law itself according to Jesus time and time again.

In this ancient time, a man could get a bill of divorce from his wife for something as significant as infidelity or as trivial as bad cooking. It was the right only of the man and not the woman. The woman was property that could be traded on such trivial matters.

But Jesus reframes their question of divorce back to the "human dignity" of treating everyone with respect. He quotes Genesis as a reminder, "God created them male and female" in his own image. No one is complete in himself or herself. We were created for relationships with one another and those relationships continue to form us in the divine image.

Jesus constantly looks beyond the arena of legality. His reframing continues with the way he welcomed the little children after the question of divorce from the Pharisees. He upbraids the disciples for missing the point about their discipleship. Just like the Pharisees wanting to lessen the divorced women placed in their society, the disciples did not want to be bothered by these lesser ones, "the little children." Jesus reframes his attention to the little children and any other person struggling with life's difficult and painful experiences. Jesus says, "Let the children come to me...for the kingdom of God belongs to such as these."



There is only One

in whom your faith is always safe,
and that is in the Lord Jesus Christ.

We would do well to imitate this "reframing" strategy when we are asked difficult questions when it comes to our Church. Many of you have shared with me how difficult it is right now to field questions about the Catholic Church and the abuse scandal. Maybe one approach is to reframe their question from a matter of faith "in the church" to a question of "faith in Jesus and the Church as the people of God."

I always agree with people who struggle with the institutional church, and I am one of the people of the institution! But I also do what Jesus does and I reframe the question to be a question about believing in Jesus. I believe the deeper question is: "Do I believe in Jesus?" and "Am I willing to fight for him and his Church?" To those questions my answer is unswervingly: "YES. I AM. I am willing to die for him." Now more than ever should we fight for Jesus and his Church. Now more than ever should we pray to Jesus. Now more than ever should we show love for Church and be his People. Now more than ever!



Altar Servers: Bearers of Light, Word, and Sacrament

As Catholics, we are especially blessed by God, particularly when looking back to the people of the Old Testament. Before the time of Jesus, the relationship that humanity had with God was much more removed; reserved to the words of the prophets, and kept to one particular place, such as the temples and mountains where the prophets interacted with God in the Old Testament. In current times, we as a Church are given the opportunity to experience God in and through the Sacrifice of the Altar. Through the Eucharist, we receive the intimate gift of union with Christ. And through ministry, we are able to give back to Him our works.

There are many ministries in which a parishioner can participate during the Eucharistic Liturgy. Of the ministries entrusted to the laity (non-ordained members of the Church), perhaps one of the oldest is the Altar Server Ministry. Originally referred to Acolytes, the Altar Servers have the longest-standing tradition of lay-ecclesial ministry in the Catholic Church.

Throughout the vast history of our Church, Acolytes have had a prominent and crucial role in the Mass. From preparing the wine and hosts to be consecrated into the body and blood of Christ to, in special circumstances, administering Communion to the Assembly.

The Altar Servers at Holy Spirit have several roles throughout the Mass. There are three Altar Server positions: Cross Bearer, Chalice Bearer, and Book Bearer. Each of these different positions have different jobs that are all important to the smooth celebration of the Mass. They assist in various tasks ranging from holding the Roman Missal for the Presider to leading both the gathering procession at the beginning of Mass and the recession once the liturgy has ended.

Pope Francis says in his 2015 address to Altar Servers, "God's call to us is a call to go out and share God's mercy and the joy of faith. It cannot be lived or protected in an underground bunker to which we flee in difficult moments." Serving at the altar, is a privileged way to draw closer to Christ, which in turn "enables you to open yourselves to others, to journey together, to set demanding goals and to find the strength to achieve them."

Stigma.

Despite mental illnesses' reach and prevalence, stigma and misunderstanding are also, unfortunately, widespread.

That is why each year, during the first full week of October, the National Alliance for Mental Illness (NAMI) and participants across the country raise awareness of mental illness. Each year, they educate the public, fight stigma and provide support. And each year, the movement grows stronger.

Mental health conditions are important to discuss year-round, but highlighting them during Mental Illness Awareness Week provides a dedicated time for mental health advocates across the country to come together as one unified voice. Since 1990, when Congress officially established the first full week of October as Mental Illness Awareness Week (MIAW), advocates have worked together to sponsor activities, large or small, to educate the public about mental illness.

In 2018, NAMI will promote the theme of "CureStigma" throughout all awareness events, including Mental Illness Awareness Week which takes place from October 7-13.

1 in 5 Americans are affected by mental health conditions. It shames them into silence. It prevents them from seeking help. And in some cases, it takes lives. Stigma against people with mental health conditions hurts us all. But the good news is that Stigma is 100% curable. Compassion, empathy and understanding are the antidote. Your voice can spread the cure. Join NAMI, the National Alliance on Mental Illness. Together we can #CureStigma.

On Tuesday, October 9, Santa Teresa Parish will host its annual Prayer and Candle Lighting Service from 7:30-8:30 p.m. Following will be a 15-20 minute presentation about local NAMI services and the compassionate sharing of a teen's journey with depression.

Thursday, October 11, is National Depression Screening Day. You can visit www.helpyourselfhelptothers.org to complete an anonymous self-assessment for yourself or a loved one.

All week: Wear green! Green is the national color of mental health awareness. Wear it to show your support for people living with mental health challenges. Help break down the barriers that prevent many from seeking the help they need.
