Note From Our Pastor

October 6th, 2019



Last weekend, I had the amazing privilege of attending a conference in Vatican City called "Common Good in the Digital Age" with a contingent of Silicon Valley executives that I had assembled to shed light on the application of ethics to Silicon Valley product development. Over the last several years, I have been meeting with a number of Silicon Valley executives (CEO's, CFO's, COO's, CTO' s, etc.) to address a number of issues that arise from the global nature of their companies and the Pontifical Council for Culture who oversees this area of ministry for the Vatican.

The Bishop in charge of this council invited me to lead a panel discussion on an ethics issue. We presented a case study on the shooting at the Mosques in Christchurch, New Zealand that were transmitted live through Facebook.

At the first session Mitchell Baker, executive chairwoman of Mozilla in Mountain View said, "The technology industry ... has had the luxury to think that

whatever product it built was for the common good. That was the shared assumption for quite some time. The defense was that liberty or human expression was embodied in the technology coming out of Silicon Valley and was undisputedly good." But we all know now that is not exactly what has happened across the industry and across the world

In our second session we addressed the shooting in Christchurch, NZ. Gavin Corn, associate general counsel and director of the cyber security law team at Facebook, one of my panelists, described how it took down 1.5 million copies within 3 hours of the live streaming by the gunman who killed 51 people in New Zealand mosques last April. Jim Welsh, General Manager, Executive Vice President for Western Digital, said how his company has removed access to a private cloud server that was retransmitting the video feed and worked with Facebook to close the loop on further propagation. Brian Green, Markkula Center's Technology Ethics Professor, Santa Clara University, outlined the ethical framework that Santa Clara University has been advocating and training within the Silicon Valley companies for over three decades. In the end, the panel discussion went very well and was well received by the attendees.

There is still much work to be done and we have only touched the tip of the iceberg of the issues involved. Bishop Paul Tighe, secretary of the Vatican's Council for Culture added, "Lot's of people working in the area of AI (artificial intelligence) are determined this should be developed ethically. We want it to be 'AI for good'." So, we will continue together with the Vatican and help humanity achieve that good.

On Friday, Pope Francis met personally with the conference attendees He challenged us to think deeper and work harder to ensure that we will meet that desired goal before it is too late. He advised us, "A better world is possible thanks to technological progress, if this is accompanied by the ethic inspired by a vision of common good." The Pope then challenged



us to not to wait too long, "If mankind's so-called technological progress were to become an enemy of the common good, this would lead to an unfortunate regression to a form of barbarism dictated by the law of the strongest." He pushed us by encouraging us to meet more and resolve these issues. "The remarkable developments in the field of technology, in particular those dealing with artificial intelligence, raise increasingly significant implications in all areas of human activity. For this reason, open and concrete discussions on this theme are needed now more than ever."

All in all, it was a spectacular session and the personal audience with the pope was a personal highlight and memory of a lifetime.

LIVING THE LITURGY



Month of the Holy Rosary

The Rosary is one of the most cherished prayers of our Catholic Church. Introduced by the Creed, the Our Father, three Hail Mary's and the Doxology ("Glory Be"), and concluded with the Salve Regina,

the Rosary involves the recitation of five decades, each consisting of the Our Father, 10 Hail Mary's, and the Doxology. During this recitation, the individual meditates on the saving mysteries of our Lord's life and the faithful witness of our Blessed Mother. Journeying through the Joyful, Sorrowful, and Glorious mysteries of the Rosary, the individual brings to mind our Lord's incarnation, His passion and death, His resurrection from the dead, and His ascension into glory. In so doing, the Rosary assists us in growing in a deeper appreciation of these mysteries, in uniting our life more closely to our Lord, and in imploring His graced assistance to live the faith.

Ingravescentibus Malis, an encyclical on the Holy Rosary, was promulgated by His Holiness Pope Pius XI on September 29, 1937. It states "that though such great and numerous evils hang over us, and others still greater are to be feared for the future, we must not lose heart nor let the confident hope that rests solely on God become fainter... Among the various supplications with which we successfully appeal to the Virgin Mother of God, the Holy Rosary without doubt occupies a special and distinct place. Therefore, we desire very earnestly that the Holy Rosary should be recited in a special manner in the month of October and with increased devotion both in the churches and in homes."

When we pray the Rosary, we ask for the prayers of our Blessed Mother, the exemplar of faith, who leads all believers to her Son." Because of the mission she received from God, her life is most closely linked with the mysteries of Jesus Christ, and there is no one who has followed in the footsteps of the Incarnate Word more closely and with more merit than she." (Mediator Dei).

Fun Facts About the Rosary

- The Rosary was John Paul II's favorite prayer and he made time to pray all 15 decades every single day.
- The word Rosary means crown of roses. Rosary is derived from rosarium a Latin word that means a crown of roses. It is believed when you pray the rosary it is like you are taking a walk through Mary's beautiful garden of roses.

Statement from the Diocese of San Jose on Pastoral Care and Support for Abuse Victims/Survivors

Bishop Oscar Cantú respects the decision of those dioceses in the state, who have chosen to participate in the California Independent Victim/Survivor Compensation and Reconciliation Program.

The Diocese of San José understands that the healing process from sexual assault is unique to every individual - particularly in the cases of clerical sexual abuse. There are many avenues for responding and caring for the victims of clergy sexual abuse.

Our victim/survivor care begins by providing victims with a safe and nurturing environment, which facilitates their first step: disclosure. Specifically, our intake process is trauma-informed and is structured to provide an empowering and validating experience for the victim/survivor to be heard, to know that the Diocese believes them, and to regain control of their narrative as they begin their healing process.

Following disclosure, a partnership is established with the victim/survivor, focusing on healing and reconciliation. Diocesan Victim Assistance Coordinators work directly with victim/survivors to complete an assessment and evaluate spiritual, clinical, and social services that the victim and his/her family need to support in their journey of healing and hope. Recognizing that victim/survivor needs may fluctuate over time, we offer ongoing pastoral and clinical care and support.

The Diocese of San José is not participating in the California Independent Victim/Survivor Compensation and Reconciliation Program. Victims/survivors will continue to receive assistance from the Diocese directly.

The Diocese strictly adheres to a zero-tolerance policy and promptly notifies law enforcement and child protective services when abuse is reported, in accordance with mandated reporter laws. The Diocese cooperates with law enforcement during any necessary investigation.

These efforts are led by the Diocesan Office for the Protection of Children and Vulnerable Adults. All reports are confidential to protect the rights of the victim. Reports to the Diocese are accepted by either online submission or by phone.
