Easter Sunday April 21, 2019



Christ is risen from the dead. Alleluia, Alleluia. After 40 days of Lent, it is great to reach this Easter Sunday and celebrate as a worldwide Church the reality of the risen Christ in our lives and the powerful message of how God's love conquers sin and hatred.

Lent this year seemed harder than previous years. Maybe it was because it was so late or maybe because the winter was wetter than usual. Or honestly, maybe it was because the Catholic Church had to go through a metanoia (conversion of mind and heart) of its own. We, as an international Church, needed to deal with the reality of the sexual abuse of the past and how the Church failed to deal with it appropriately years ago. It was time to turn away from the sin of cover ups and acknowledge the terri-

ble curse of sexual abuse and stop covering up the reality of the horrible sin. I don't think we have fully dealt with it yet but at least as a local diocese we have stepped forward and owned the past. We have proactively led the way in being transparent and accountable. The Church universal needs to now do the same and we need to call it to action. The pain of the past will not heal until we have admitted our mistakes and made amends. We now need to

enter into the Easter season with hearts renewed and convinced of the power of God's love to conquer all evil.

The message of Easter and that of the resurrection is the ultimate victory over sin, hatred and death. When God became human in Jesus Christ, he was not trying to change his mind about humanity but change humanity's mind about God. He took on the human condition not to coerce or manipulate the heart of humans but rather as witness to his true nature; that he is a God of love.

Jesus exemplified this mandate by the way he lived his life. Loving all people, especially those in need and his enemies who perceived him to be a threat. He showed us the way of forgiveness and love. That will ultimately grant us freedom.

The ultimate message of Easter is that love wins. The older I get, the more I am convinced that while most people believe in God they still don't understand the central message of Easter: God loves us personally and knows us by name. He became one of us to show us the way; he died to show us not to fear him but rather to live life in the sure and certain knowledge that God loves us.

Our God is a God of love; he cannot help himself. He will love us no matter what. Today, we celebrate that Christ is Risen! Ultimately that means that God's love is unstoppable; even death cannot stop it. That is awesome news and if we could only realize that changes everything completely forever! We ought to feel the joy of every day.

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An Easter Prayer

O Lord,

How amazing is your love, A love that overcomes, endures and redeems.

How astounding is your life, A life that sustains, heals and creates.

How awesome is your hope, A hope that promises, restores and inspires. How absorbing is your truth, A truth that releases, changes and rebuilds.

How we worship you, as we remember the moment when your love conquered. When out of the cave of sorrow Jesus arose to release forgiveness to the world. And each time we encounter this resurrection day we are again lifted to an eternal place.

Our sin, brokenness and darkness fall away and your light and peace flood our lives. How we thank you for this incredible celebration we call Easter.

Today we celebrate that we are all feeling good and that we are called to spread that goodness, that joy out to the whole world. This is a new dawn. This is a new day. And it is a new life...in the Resurrection of Christ himself.

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Eschatology-the second coming of Jesus

It was really challenging to gather facts with regards to the doctrine of the Second Coming of Jesus Christ. They all pointed to the same eschatological, or end of times, discourse that could be found in the Synoptic Gospels which is sometimes called the Synoptic Apocalypse.

In addition, Ulrich Luz, a bible commentator, wrote that Apocalyptic texts do not simply relate to historical experiences; they must be interpreted from a point of view that lies beyond history, which modern readers can understand their relevance. Jesus Christ Himself makes use of biblical language and traditional images in order to interpret and reinterpret the experiences of the community from a divine perspective.

It is not that it is so complicated to understand or to comprehend the doctrine on the Second Coming of Jesus Christ, but this is one of the mysteries of our faith. It is not that it is unexplainable, but it is so overwhelming to learn and to absorb. This glorious event must be the most climactic, historical, ultimate, and momentous episode in human history. Jesus Christ will come again.

When? We don't know. We must remain vigilant and watchful. Time is not of the essence here. The truth about this doctrine showed us the love of the Triune God. He was the God of the past, He is the God of the present, and ultimately, He will be the God of the future, i.e. the glorious and the triumphant God.

It is very important for the people of God to know this and to share this good news. It is hoped that they will be motivated to exercise greater faith in God and change their ways eventually. Again, what is important is to prepare ourselves and be ready anytime for Jesus Christ's second coming.

Survival Sack Distribution

Holy Spirit parishioners are continuing to volunteer to distribute Survival Sacks at Sacred Heart Community Center. We gather on the **first and third Thursdays** of the month to distribute Survival Sacks, organize supplies, make hygiene kits, and



fill backpacks. Sacks are provided to those who are homeless and living on the streets of San Jose. We usually distribute 40 Sacks per day.

Survival Sacks will be distributed on May 2nd and **16th.** The signup link can be found, starting April 29th on the parish website at holyspiritchurch.org/sacred-heart-community-service/.Volunteers must be 16 or older. We meet at Sacred Heart at **8:45 a.m.** and finish up around **10:45 a.m.**

We have the privilege of looking for the face of Christ in each of our clients. If you are unable to volunteer, we would request that you say the following prayer for the homeless each day during your meditation time:

God of compassion, your love for humanity was revealed in Jesus whose earthly life began in a stable and ended in the pain and isolation of the cross. We hold before you those who are homeless. Draw near and comfort them in spirit and bless those who provide them with shelter, food, and friendship. We ask in Jesus' name. Amen.

Saturday Lunch Ministry

We meet in the Parish Hall at 10:30 a.m. to make sandwiches and then pack the lunches, which include sandwiches, fruit, cookie, and a drink.

After the lunches have been made, we drive to the St. James Park area of downtown San Jose. The **sandwiches are distributed** to everyone in the park.

When everyone has been served, part of the group follows the light rail tracks into the center of the city and distributes sandwiches as they walk. The part of the group who remains in the park **cleans up litter**. Even litter that isn't part of the Holy Spirit lunches will be cleared away.

We invite ten families to join us **on May 4th**, the first Saturday of the month. We ask for a one to one ratio of adults to students as parents need to be with their child especially during the distribution in St. James Park. Student participation is limited to sixth grade and older. A donation of \$10 is asked from each family to cover the cost of food and supplies. The Paschal Candle



During Easter Vigil, the priest or deacon carries the Paschal candle in procession into the dark church. The fire symbolizes our eternal life in Christ. The candle, representing Christ, the Light of the World, is blessed by the priest. During the blessing, pins containing gains incense is placed

on the cross along with the Greek letters A and Ω to indicate that Christ is the beginning and the end of all. The numbers of the current year is also placed on to the candle.

The Paschal candle remains in the Sanctuary during the full 50 days of the Easter season, and is lit for liturgical services during that time. After Pentecost, the candle will be placed next to the baptismal font.

The Paschal candle is lit during all baptisms. There, parents receive a candle lit from the Paschal candle, on behalf of their newly baptized child. The Paschal candle is also lit at funerals as a sign that Christ has conquered death, and that in him, we too receive the promise of eternal life.
