NOTE FROM OUR PASTOR



Holy Spirit Parish is well known as a welcoming community. While this is a great attribute, I wanted to understand exactly what we do that makes new parishioners feel so welcomed. They mentioned several things that are important to them. They say they love the way we welcome visitors at the


beginning of each Mass and recognize from where they are visiting. Often new parishioners don't raise their hands because they are shy, but they appreciate the gesture of welcome. They also mention how there are so many staff outside of Mass before and after to chat to about the parish activities as well as other active parishioners. They mention how important the many different social justice activities are to them especially the mission trips to Nicaragua, Texas and locally with Sacred Heart Community Service and our Village House. They also express their delight at all the different ways to Grow in Friendship with Jesus. Overall they love how incredibly active the community is in living out their faith.

Then how can we improve and how can we make a difference over the Christmas time when we will have 1,000's of extra people coming to Church? No matter how welcoming I, as a pastor am, if I welcome and shake hands with 500 or 1,000, I will do well but there will be over 5,000 souls at Masses on Christmas Eve and Christmas Day. So what can we do? All parishioners can welcome and be part of this hospitality and see it as an opportunity to welcome others back to Church and not see them as a nuisance or them as "those who take my seat."

I recently had a conversation with a parishioner who has mastered the art of welcoming others. She and her husband, like most of us, sit in the same place each weekend. Once when a new parishioner came and sat next to them. They introduced themselves and welcomed her. They spoke of all the different ministries we have here and encouraged her to try out a Growing in Friendship with Jesus session or get involved in the Village House. At the end of the conversation, they said to the new parishioner. "It was really wonderful to meet you. We always sit here and when you come to Church, come and sit with us. It would be great to see you again." Wow! What a wonderful way to welcome someone. Now we know why new parishioner became so active in all the different ministries.

If every parishioner could reach out to those who sit near them this Christmas in this way, then we might have the chance of welcoming back someone who might have strayed from the Church. It is not for us to judge why others might have left the Church but more important that we welcome them home.

This Christmas let's welcome everybody into our seats!



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Advent Wreaths by the USCCB

Advent (from, "ad-venire" in Latin) is the season encompassing the four Sundays leading up to the celebration of Christmas and marks the beginning of the Church's liturgical year.



The Advent season is a time of preparation that directs our hearts and minds to Christ's second

coming at the end of time and also to the anniversary of the Lord's birth on Christmas day. Advent devotions including the Advent wreath, remind us of the meaning of the season. Traditionally, Advent wreaths re made of a circle of evergreen branches into which four candles are inserted, representing the four weeks of Advent. Ideally, three candles are purple and one is rose, but white candles can also be used.

The purple candles symbolize the prayer, penance, and preparatory sacrifices and good works undertaken at this time. The rose candle is lit on the third Sunday, Gaudete Sunday, when the priest also wears rose vestments at Mass: Gaudete Sunday is the Sunday of rejoicing, because the faithful have arrived at the midpoint of Advent, when their preparation is now half-over and they are close to Christmas.

The progressive lighting of the candles symbolizes the expectation and hope surrounding our Lord's birth into the world and anticipation of His second coming to judge both the living and the dead.

The use of the Advent Wreath is a traditional practice which has found its place in the Church as well as in the home. The blessing of an Advent Wreath takes place on the First Sunday of Advent, or on the evening before the First Sunday of Advent. When the blessing of the Advent Wreath is celebrated in the home, it is appropriate that it be blessed by a parent or another member of the family.

A Refresher Why We do What We do! Part 6

Why does everyone dip their fingers in the water when they come into Church?



The water in either the Baptismal font or the little fonts fastened to the walls of the entry of the Church is holy water. When we enter the Church, we dip our fingers in the water and make the sign of the cross on our ourselves to recall our Baptism.

It is through Baptism that we enter the Church (as Christians) and it is through Baptism that we receive our identity as adopted children of God, and we receive our initial call by God to live differently. We enter our celebration of Mass with this ritual to remind ourselves that we are children of God, in God's house, sharing the most special meal that God offers us with God's other children.

We say that the Church is the "body of Christ," and this water reminds us that our parish family and our worldwide family of believers all make up that body. We belong to each other, are responsible to one another and are called to share our faith and our lives with one another. And we are all united and have our sin forgiven through this one Baptism.

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Diocese of San José Receives Administrative Subpoena

On December 9, the Diocese of San José, along with five other dioceses in California, received administrative subpoenas from the California Attorney General's office requesting documents related to the mandatory reporting of allegations of sexual misconduct with minors by clergy and laypersons within the Diocese from 1996 to the present.

Before receiving the subpoena, the Diocese provided the Attorney General with more than a thousand documents that did not affect the privacy rights of victims/survivors or disregard state and federal labor laws regarding personnel files and volunteer records. These documents were provided in response to the statewide administrative review initiated by the Attorney General in May 2019.

We, the Diocese of San José, believe that protecting all children, youth, and vulnerable adults and bringing about justice, reconciliation, and healing to all victims/survivors is our sacred duty. We have an important responsibility to protect the privacy and legal rights of victims/survivors, lay employees, lay volunteers, and clergy.

In this sense, a subpoena may be good and preferable to an informal request for documents without legal protection. It supports our shared goal of ensuring that the safeguards in place for our children are working as they should while protecting the privacy rights of victims/survivors and complying with state and federal labor laws.

The Diocese of San José provides ongoing comprehensive services and care to victims/survivors of sexual abuse and encourage anyone who has not previously come forward to do so, first, by contacting the local authorities: police department or sheriff's office; and second, by making a report to our Office for the Protection of Children and Vulnerable Adults, toll-free at (844) 372-1691 or online via a third-party site, opcva.ethicspoint.com.

The Diocese will not be complacent. We pledge to continue working tirelessly to provide safe and nurturing environments for all and fostering a path of healing and reconciliation for those who have suffered abuse.
