### 2018 Nicaragua Mission Trips, First Youth Trip



Commemorating our 10th year of partnership with Amigos for Christ and our mission in rural Nicaragua, Holy Spirit is planning three mission trips to Nicaragua for 2018. Since our first trip in 2009 with 26

missionaries, the trip has blossomed into a popular annual sojourn with over 100 missionaries and two other churches. Part of its success has been its unique blend of youth, adults, and families. In 2018, we will include our first high school youth trip, our traditional family-focused trip, and a first-time adult-only trip providing each with its own unique experience.

### Our 2018 schedule will include the following:

Youth Week, Saturday, July 7th - Saturday, July 14th

This trip is open to youth entering their junior or senior year of high school. Graduated seniors may also attend as youth participants. The trip will be led by Youth Director Row David and organized as a traditional youth mission trip with adult chaperones. The trip will focus on working in poor villages in rural Nicaragua during the day and music, fellowship, and play in the evenings.

- Family Week, Saturday, July 14th Saturday, July 21st This trip is our traditional multi-generational trip open to all adults and parents or close relatives (e.g. aunt/uncle) with youth. Young persons must be at least entering their freshman year in high school. Parents with older high school youth are also welcomed to attend. Unaccompanied minors are
- Adult Week, Saturday, October 20th Saturday, October 27th This trip is open to all adults. It will include engagement with communities with which Amigos for Christ is partnering. Service is still an important element, but perhaps not with the same physical intensity as the other groups. The trip will be a blend of service and spiritual retreat including opportunities for prayer and reflection.

### NOTE FROM OUR PASTOR



Over the years as a priest, I have asked myself, "what does it take for us to listen to God's desire for us; what does it take for us to tune into what God is saying to us?" The reason why I ask that of myself is because it often seems that most of us only listen to God or engage with God in times of crisis. When I am cramming for a test at school, when I am about to interview for a job, or when my parent or child is

sick. Then we cry out to God, "Oh God! Hear my prayer." It seems that we are hard-wired to go about our business until we hit a snag and then we "pray to God."

Obviously, that is not true for all of us. Many of us come here weekly and there is no crisis in our lives, at least not right now! But we come regardless of the crisis and that is part of who we are. But it seems that a huge portion of Catholics operate from this "crisis only" mode. After all, we have just finished celebrating Christmas when we had over 5,000 people attend Mass on Christmas Eve or Christmas Day. That is nearly 3 times our normal Sunday. Yes, there are visitors from out of town, but the vast majority are regular Catholics who only attend Christmas and Easter Only (CEOs). So why?

I really don't know but I keep asking myself, what can we do better? What can we say better? It seems that everything comes up short. Yet in asking the question, I see some inherent issues with the way we ask the question. We presume that people "want to see or hear God!" That is a major assumption! So, I examine that assumption. Why would we not want to see or hear God?

I truly believe that is the major issue. We are human beings and we are forever making God in our own image. Putting onto God what we think God should be doing or saying. We limit God to what we think he would do! There lies the real issue. I find that our image of God is so small, so limited, so narrow, so punitive, so demanding that sometimes I am not sure "I even want to listen or see" God.

Then I pray and listen to God and find him to be gentle, kind, forgiving, understanding, and loving. I find myself to

grow bigger inside of God's presence.

As Fr. Greg Boyle puts it, "Despite God's magnitude we have managed successfully to domesticate God. We say, 'beg, rollover, go fetch.' We prefer to have God do our biding. We have trained God, if you will, to do his business outside [of us.] But no doubt He prefers the mess inside [of us.]"

It is my experience that God only wants what is best for us. He wants to love us where we are right now. He only cares in loving us because loving is what he does! May we not project onto God any narrow image of God but accept a bigger God. May we accept and celebrate that God loves us just where we are. May we pray and experience it for ourselves. I am convinced that if we can do that then others will want to be part of that community. Happy New Year!

### LIVING THE LITURGY

### The Fifteen Days of Christmas

Every year in November, the secular world officially declares Christmas season. As soon as Thanksgiving ends, the Christmas decorations and clothing appear in stores, and people begin to buy their Christmas trees and book their flights to see family and friends. And, as soon as Christmas Day passes, we see lights taken down from eaves, and trees removed from homes and sitting curbside ready to be picked up as garbage. While it might seem like a good idea to get a jump on post-holiday cleanup, nothing could be further from the truth for the Catholic Church.

Many believe that the Catholic Church celebrates 12 days of Christmas. The song, "The Twelve Days of Christmas," refers to a time after Christmas during which we continue to celebrate Christmas, each day slightly different than the one before. During the time the Church refers to as the Christmas season, there are several smaller feast days that we use to pray for specific intentions within the Church. For example, last Sunday was the feast day of the Holy Family, during which we celebrate the Christian Family exemplified by Jesus, Mary and Joseph. The day following was New Year's Day: the Feast of Mary the Holy Mother of God. From the Feast of Holy Innocents on December 28th to The Feast of the Holy Name of Jesus on January 3rd, there are a number of intentions that we use as a church to pray and contemplate the coming of Jesus Christ. This Christmas season extends to this weekend, the Epiphany of the Lord, and reaches its completion on January 8th, the Baptism of the Lord.

With all this being said, the truth of the matter is that the Twelve Days of Christmas are, in fact, not twelve days at all! The Christmas season, stretching from Christmas Day until the Baptism of the Lord, adds up to fifteen days, not twelve! After the Baptism of the Lord, the Liturgical calendar returns to Ordinary Time. But, until then, we should remember to be aware of the three main points of the Christmas Season:

- -The Christmas Feast proper, better known as the Octave of Christmas, extends from Christmas Day, December 25th, until the Feast of Mary Holy Mother of God, January 1st. The merriment and cheer of our Christmas Celebration should continue through these eight days.
- -The Christmas season reaches its culmination during the Feast of the Epiphany, which we celebrate this weekend; on January 6th, or the Sunday that sits between January 2nd and January 8th. Make sure those Christmas decorations stay up until then!
- -The Christmas season officially ends on January 8th, the Baptism of the Lord. So make sure to keep your nativity scene up, and keep the Spirit of the Christmas season alive!

6200 children received gifts, including 600 bikes. You helped so many of our neighbors give joy and hope to their families during these special times of the year.

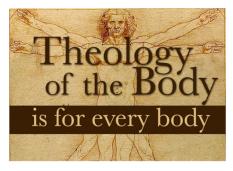
#### **Survival Sacks**

### New Year's Resolutions for Children...Now that They Made them, How to Keep Them

Turning a good intention into a habit is "one of the most important skills we can teach our kids," says Christine Carter, Ph.D., author of *Raising Happiness: 10 Simple Steps for More Joyful Kids and Happier Parents.* "It's the key to happiness in life." She suggests that parents help kids break their resolutions down into "ridiculously easy turtle steps." "Self-discipline is like a muscle that grows slowly," she says. "If you do too much at first, you will get fatigued and not be successful."

Dr. Carter says it takes six weeks to create a habit. For instance, if your child's resolution is "I'm going to keep my room neater," he should write down six tiny, easy steps and practice one each week. "The first week he puts his shoes in the closet, the second week he picks his pillow up off the floor, and so on," Dr. Carter says. Your child might actually end up doing much more than this. "There's a massive spillover effect," she says. "Once people are engaged in their goal, they will do other things as well." Have your kids fill in the spaces on their big list with these tiny steps or download "turtle steps" worksheets from Dr. Carter's habit tracker.

Robin Goodman, Ph.D., a clinical psychologist and art therapist who has written books on children and stress also believes in breaking down broad resolutions into

specific, easy-to-do steps. Her examples:

I will help more around the house ... by setting the table for dinner.

I will improve my reading ... by reading 15 minutes before I go to bed.

I will eat more healthful foods ... by eating one fruit at breakfast and one vegetable at dinner.

It's fine to check in with kids each week and acknowledge how they're doing, but Dr. Carter advises against tangible rewards. "You can't bribe kids into doing this. Once you make it external with rewards, you lose them."

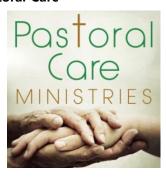

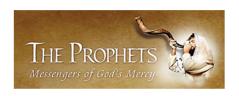

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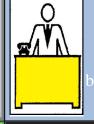
