NOTE FROM OUR PASTOR



On May 21 our new bishop, Bishop Oscar Cantu celebrated the 25th anniversary of his ordination to priesthood. In his homily at that Mass, he took that opportunity to share his vision for the diocese for the next



years. Based on his observations over the last 10 months, he challenged us to build on our strengths and take actions in three ways:

Culture of Vocations

Culture of Encounter

Culture of Innovation

Over the next several weeks I would like to break open these three challenges for us here at Holy Spirit Parish. It all starts with our vision of our life choice. How can we listen to God, our creator and choose what he wants for us, choose his vision for us?

Bishop Cantu reminded us that “while society has changed dramatically over the past few decades, the human heart continues to seek what is true, love what is good, and yearn for what is beautiful. God continues to knock at the doors of our hearts, even today. He calls us to a loving and graced relationship. Among the panorama of vocations, God calls most of the faithful to the beautiful and challenging vocation of marriage and family life. How important it is that we see this as a call; for our marriages and families are strengthened and deepened by the acknowledged presence of God.

Yet, others are called to the single life, in which one can be engaged in a variety of opportunities for service to the church and the wider community, sharing what God has given to them. Still others are called to consecrated life, a life of prayer and witness for the Gospel, while some are called to the ordained ministry as deacons and priests.”

His desire is that we intentionally create a “culture of vocations” in our homes, in our parishes, in our youth groups, in our classrooms, and social gatherings. This new initiative is called “Creating a Culture of Vocations,” will allow us not only to pray for vocations, but to dialogue as families and in classroom settings about the reality of God’s call, and how we might attune our hearts to hear and respond to this call.

To that end the bishop gave every parish and school a cross. He asks us to have a different family take the cross home after weekend Mass and to pray that every person in their family and parish discover their own individual vocation in their life, to learn their call, to live out their discipleship and then pass the cross to another family at the next weekend Mass. We will start our local program at Holy Spirit Parish in the weeks ahead and pass the cross from one family to another. If every one of us can genuinely discover what God is calling us to live, then I am convinced that we all will be joyful people.

Next week I will share with you the second challenge about a “culture of encounter.”

LIVING THE LITURGY



The Presider's Chair

Last week we said that in this season of Ordinary Time, it is a good time to reflect on the signs and symbols we see each time we enter our church and explore what they really mean to our celebration of the Eucharist.

This week we will talk about the Presider's Chair, another prominent symbol in the sanctuary.

By the way, the Sanctuary is the place where the altar stands, where the word of God is proclaimed, and where the priests, the deacons, and other ministers exercise their office functions. Thus, it should be distinguishable from the main body of the church either by being elevated or by structure and ornamentation.

The Presider's chair is for the priest celebrant. It stands as a symbol of his priestly office, of presiding over the assembly of the faithful, and of directing prayer. It is appropriate that, before being put into liturgical use, the chair be blessed according to the rite described in the Roman Ritual. The chair also reflects the dignity of the one who leads the community in the person of Christ. Thus, the most suitable place for the chair is facing the people at the head of the sanctuary, but it is never intended to be apart, distinctive, or grandiose.

SEEL (19th Annotation) – The Spiritual Exercises in Everyday Life

The Spiritual Exercises are a compilation of meditations, prayers, and contemplative practices developed by St. Ignatius Loyola to help people deepen their relationship with God. For centuries the Exercises were most commonly given as a “long retreat” of about 30 days in solitude and silence. In recent years, there has been a renewed emphasis on the Spiritual Exercises as a program for laypeople.

The most common way of going through the Exercises now is a “retreat in daily life (19th Annotation, SEEL),” which involves an eight-month long experience of daily prayer and weekly meetings with a Giver of the S.E.

Retreat will run from September 2019-May 2020.

Spiritual Support for Family or Friends Part 1 of 3

People who are very ill often ask spiritual questions, in seeking comfort, meaning and hope. While clergy and pastoral care ministers may play an important role in spiritual care, family and friends can offer important spiritual support too. If you have the opportunity to provide spiritual support for someone living with an illness, here are some suggestions:

Explore your own beliefs and values before you talk to others.

To support others spiritually, it's important to understand your own spiritual beliefs about illness. Think of a time when you faced a major life change, loss or severe pain.

- How did it affect you spiritually?
- How did your spirituality affect the experience?
- Did you discover spiritual strength during that time?
- Did you ever question your faith?
- How did you want to be supported spiritually?

If you have not been diagnosed with a serious illness yourself, exploring these questions will help you understand your spirituality when facing life-changing situations.
