## NOTE FROM OUR PASTOR



As I write this bulletin article I am in Zephyr Cove, Lake Tahoe, Nevada on our Annual Diocesan Youth Retreat (DYSR) with more than 260 youth from all over the diocese. There are about 60 leaders here including Rev. David, our Youth Director (and director of the DYSR program), John Kellet, our Worship Director and myself, as well as many young adults from Holy Spirit Parish. Here is a picture of all Holy Spirit Parish youth and staff. We make up over 70 of the 330 people here.

It has been a few years since I have been able to come up here and stay the whole week. I forgot how beautiful this place is and how special it can be when we focus on the love of Christ. We are having an amazing time and the youth are so open to the movement of the Spirit. We have daily Mass for them as well as faith development sessions teaching them how to pray and make Jesus our best friend. We have four priests including myself here for the whole week which is a great blessing. All of us are having powerful conversations with the youth and young adults about their struggles in life and expression of their faith in their real world. It has been really amazing.



On Wednesday night we will celebrate the Sacrament of Reconciliation and more than 20 priests from the Diocese of San Jose will travel to be with their students. This is always one of the most powerful moments of the retreat when the students offload all their burdens and give them to God. With the weight of their sins lifted, they are like new children; their eyes brighten, their stride lengthens and they walk with a spring in their step, they start to smile widely and their whole world changes.

On Thursday night we will have Mass in the theatre that overlooks the Lake as the sun sets over the mountain. It is another one of those highlights and a joy to celebrate.

When we close on Friday morning with Mass for the students again, we have them commit to following Christ in a more deliberate way in the year ahead.

Again, it is such amazing to see these young people commit publicly to being a disciple of Christ once again. It is such a joy to see and it energizes me with a renewal of my faith. I always come back from here exhausted but completely on fire with my own faith again. It is an honor and privilege to be here. Thanks to the parish for allowing the staff and me to come away and give witness to so many.

## Question of the Week

John the Baptist was set aside for a very special purpose, to prepare for the coming of Jesus. How do I prepare the way for Jesus?

### A Lifestyle of Worship

The word "worship" is often thrown around in the Christian world as something that is both basic and crucial to our Christian faith. And while the word has a basic meaning in Christianity, and it certainly is crucial to our relationship with God, it is by no means a simple subject to describe to a friend when put on the spot. It is easy to misunderstand what worship is, and it is easy to mistake worship as something else.

One way Christians misinterpret worship is when it is compared to praise. Praise is the act of acknowledging the good or accomplishment of another. In this way, we can certainly give praise to God for giving us life and creating the earth on which we live. But, we can also give praise to a friend for keeping an incredibly clean house, or a spouse who has surprised you with a kind deed. It is in this way that worship can contain praise, but praise is not always worship.

Merriam-Webster defines worship as, "to show respect or love for God or for a god especially by praying, having religious services, etc." This definition is accurate as worship, but leaves out a supremely intimate element in which we as Catholics partake as one of the great mysteries of faith. According to the teachings of the Church, worship has to do with a giving of self in order to deepen our relationship and intimacy with God.

We bring this intimacy into worship in its two main categories: external and internal worship. All of our liturgies, which serve our church community as our source of communal prayer, are forms of external worship; from Eucharistic Adoration, to the blessing of the animals and Sunday Mass that we attend every weekend. In these liturgies, we incorporate many forms of worship, most of which revolve around the breaking open of the Word of God and the receiving the Eucharist. Personal prayer, when utilized to fully immerse oneself into a personal intimacy with God, is a form of internal worship.

In a sermon, Fr. Richard Rohr says that "to worship is... to devote oneself body and soul to the creative act, associating oneself with the act in order to fulfill the world by hard work and intellectual exploration." Our internal worship prepares our minds, hearts, and spirits for communal prayer and external worship. But this external worship in which we celebrate as a Church should not stop when the liturgy ends. We are charged with a responsibility to continue our worship, not just with our friends and fellow parishioners, but with the whole world.

Just as we encounter Christ in each other, we as a church must continue to develop our relationship with God through worship in our everyday life as well as in Liturgy; cultivating a community of worship with our lives."

"... Now, as many of you know, the Holy Spirit School motto is: faith, knowledge, community. These three words are what we excel at, what we stand for, the goals we as students strive every day to achieve. In the words of last year's recipient of the Beck Cully Award, Andrew Almeida: "prayer isn't just a bunch of words that we memorize only to repeat every day; it's a way of life." As Catholics, prayer is what we live by, and Holy Spirit School has taught me just that. From trying to avoid going to Sunday Mass to actually wanting to be Confirmed into the Catholic Church, my faith has developed so much since I first came here.

While faith and knowledge are both integral to our school, the last of the three core values, community, is what I believe truly makes this school the best in the diocese. Every one of us in this room right now is connected with one another in a very special way: we all are a part of the Holy Spirit community. It may not sound like much, but this community is like my second family. I've spent more time with many of you than I have with anyone else, other than my immediate family. And it's not just my friends; as I said before, the faculty and teachers here are some of the kindest people I know. One of my fondest memories of this dates back to the start of first grade, when I was in Mrs. Porter's class. At the time, I was the shortest kid in the entire grade, and while I still am not that tall today, I was much, much shorter back then...

**Elder Abuse, Part 2**

"World Elder Abuse Awareness Day" was June 15th. Last week began a 3-part series on elder abuse. The following list are signs for concern, according to the National Council on Aging, as they could be the result of possible abuse.

- Bruises, pressure marks, broken bones, abrasions, burns.
- Unexplained withdrawal from normal activities; a sudden change in alertness, or unusual depression; strained or tense relationships; frequent arguments between the caregiver and older adult.
- Sudden changes in financial situation.
- Bedsores, unattended medical needs, poor hygiene, unusual weight loss.
- Belittling, threats, or other uses of power and control by individuals.

How can families and concerned advocates protect senior loved ones from elder abuse? Know the red flags above. Keep in close touch with elders. Visit often. When hiring in-home care, choose a reputable agency that performs background checks and supervises caregivers. Help loved ones with banking and finances, if

appropriate. Create a network of support with neighbors, healthcare teams and faith communities.

**If you suspect a senior is being abused**

Many seniors who have been victimized hesitate to talk about it. They may feel ashamed. They may not want to get a relative in trouble. They may fear retribution from the abuser. And they may feel that the abuser is their only source of care. If you suspect an elder has been victimized, reassure them that it is not their fault—and report it to local Adult Protective Services for Santa Clara County at [www.sccgov.org](http://www.sccgov.org) or 408-975-4900.

By reporting your suspicions, you could make a huge difference in the life of a vulnerable elder. If your suspicions turn out to be incorrect, nothing is lost. Most cases of elder abuse go undetected. The agency receiving the report will ask what you observed, who was involved, and who they can contact to learn more. Your identity will not be revealed and you do not need to prove that abuse is occurring. It is up to the professionals to investigate any suspicions.






