What crosses do I carry in my life due to the fact that I follow Jesus?



Last week I spoke at all the Masses in the 4-Minutes about the need to reset our lives. I likened the challenge in life to the times that our computers or phones freeze up. You know that feeling when your iPhone or computer just stops working and often right in the middle of a project.? That spinning ball or blue screen can be frightening! We pray hard that we have not lost too much work. So what do we do?

We reset our phone or computers and go about our projects again. That "hard reset" gets the computer back to its former condition. The device is programmed that way to "reset" easily enough and most times it works seamlessly even though we might wait anxiously for minutes.

The same is true for our spiritual lives. We are programmed to "reset" each week with a Sabbath day and then annually with a vacation. That is the way Lord made us and commanded us to take a Holy Day every week. The challenge is that many of us don't take a weekend to relax but get even busier with more work projects or other home projects. Then our vacations seem to be equally as amped up. So what are we do?



We need to somehow "reset" our lives and especially our spiritual lives. When we don't, things start to go wrong. We get testy or unpleasant with our spouses and/or our children. Work starts to unravel in some way. Our friends seem to be at odds with us like never before. These are all signals that the system is about to freeze and go into "blue screen" mode. We need to stop and reset our lives. We need to come away on retreat or at the very least start a new prayer discipline.

I ask you to consider joining us for the new *Growing in Friendship with Jesus* series coming up this Fall. At the very least, I would love for you to join us at one of the plantings sessions that begin the week of **September 9th**. We will be sharing more with you over the weeks ahead so please stay tuned.

If you can take a full weekend away I encourage you to join me on retreat **October 18-20** at the Jesuit Retreat Center in Los Altos. This retreat led by me is titled "*Hard Resetting Your Spiritual Life.*" I will focus what can we do to refocus our lives back on Jesus and his mission for us.

I know I sound like a broken record, but it is critical to deepen our relationship with Jesus and hear where he is calling us to grow. We need PRAYER. We need to move closer to Jesus so we can understand how God wants us to lead our lives for the good of all, including ourselves. Come and reset your life this Fall.

LIVING THE LITURGY

Sacred Vessels

One of the most visible signs or symbols used during liturgy are the sacred vessels, especially the chalice (or wine cup) and the paten (or metal plate). According to the General Instruction of the Roman Missal, the sacred vessels are held in special honor because from them the bread and wine are offered, consecrated and then consumed by the faithful.

Sacred vessels should be made from precious metal. If they are made from metal that rusts or from a metal less precious than gold, they should generally be gilded (covered thinly with gold leaf or gold paint) on the inside. In the Dioceses of the United States of America, it can be made from other solid materials which in the common estimation in each region are considered precious or noble, for example, ebony or other harder woods, provided that such materials are suitable for sacred use. This also applies to all other sacred vessels that are intended to hold the Consecrated Hosts, such as the communion paten (a metal plate holder for the distribution of the Hosts to the faithful), the ciborium (a large covered cup that holds the reserved Hosts and place inside the tabernacle), the pyx (a small round container to carry the Hosts for the sick), and the monstrance (an open or transparent vessel in which the Host is exposed for veneration). Additional chalices or cups that are used to distribute the Precious Blood, should be made of material that does not absorb liquids.



Scripture Study



Holy Spirit Scripture Study begins a new study **Wednesday, September 18th**, Acts: *The Spread of the Kingdom*, by Jeff Cavins.

The Acts of the Apostles shows the Church, enlivened by the Holy Spirit, teaching, preaching healing, and restoring the outcasts in the same way that Jesus did on earth. It provides a historic framework for understanding the rest of the New Testament. Paul's letters come alive in a new way when they are read within the context of Acts. You will learn how the Gospel witness spread outward in waves, from Jerusalem to Judea, and Samaria, and to the ends of the earth. Share with the early Christians the joys and struggles of living the life of Christ, and learn how these still apply today.

We meet from 9:15AM until 11:00 in the Parish Hall. The cost of the study is \$40. for the study guide. All are welcome, no matter where you are in your faith journey or scripture study experience.

Saturday Lunch Ministry



We meet in the Parish Hall at 10:30am to make sandwiches and then pack the lunches, which include sandwiches, fruit, cookie, and a drink. After the lunches have been made, we drive to the St. James Park area of downtown San Jose.

The **lunches are distributed** to everyone in the park. When everyone has been served, part of the group follows the light rail tracks into the center of the city and distributes lunches as they walk. The part of the group who remains in the park **cleans up litter**. Even litter that isn't part of the Holy Spirit lunches will be cleared away.

We invite ten families to join us **every 1st Saturday of the month***. We ask for a one to one ratio of adults to students as parents need to be with their child especially during the distribution in St. James Park. Student participation is limited to sixth grade and older. A donation of \$10 is asked from each family to cover the cost of food and supplies.


Why RCIA?



To search, to belong, to mature, to be nourished, to continue growing, to love and be loved: these and others are fundamental stirrings of the human heart. Our lives are lived in a manner of seeking satisfaction of these very deep hungers throughout the journey of life. RCIA is the experience of discovering that one's journey is caught up in the mystery of God's loving plan for all people.

For adults who sense a desire to become members or learn more of the Catholic Church, RCIA is the prayerful manner in which the journey to Catholic Christianity unfolds. Ordinarily, the journey follows the Church's Liturgical Year and culminates in the Celebration of Jesus' Resurrection at the Easter Vigil.

Though RCIA (Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults) has been mistakenly identified as 'convert classes' it is the procedure for unbaptized adults and adults of other Christian Churches to become members of the Catholic Church, RCIA deeply touches all aspects of Church life. In short, RCIA is the way we are Church. RCIA is a prayer of the Church that springs from God the Father's relentless and passionate desire that all respond to the offer of Divine Love in His Son, Jesus the Christ, and manifest that love in the power of the Holy Spirit as members of the Body of Christ to the world.



Depression in Seniors

As we grow older, we face significant life changes that can put us at risk for depression. Causes and risk factors that contribute to depression in older adults and the elderly include:

- **Health problems**—Illness and disability; chronic or severe pain; cognitive decline; damage to body image due to surgery or disease.
- **Loneliness and isolation** – Living alone; a dwindling social circle due to deaths or relocation; decreased mobility due to illness or loss of driving privileges.
- **Reduced sense of purpose** – Feelings of purposelessness or loss of identity due to retirement or physical limitations on activities.
- **Fears** – Fear of death or dying; anxiety over financial problems or health issues.
- **Recent bereavement** – The death of friends, family members, and pets; the loss of a spouse or partner.

Depression not only makes you feel sick—with aches, pains, and fatigue—it actually makes physical health worse. Depression also gets in the way of memory and concentration.

Report Misconduct

Those responsible for the spiritual and material goods of the Church are entrusted with the stewardship of others' gifts, and are ultimately responsible to the Lord. As a faithful steward, the Roman Catholic Diocese of San Jose is committed to maintaining the highest standards of conduct and ethics. The mission of the Church requires no less. To this end, the Diocese of San Jose has partnered with EthicsPoint to provide a

confidential method to hear suggestions, concerns or reports of financial misconduct. The EthicsPoint Hotline allows parishioners, volunteers, employees, vendors and others to make confidential reports regarding the mismanagement of parish or school property, cash and all other assets. Reportable are also issues of apparent disregard of policies pertaining to the proper management of these assets. Suspected unethical behavior by employees, volunteers, staff, trustees, officers, directors, agents or contractors of the Diocese should also be made to EthicsPoint. All reports may be made anonymously.

It is the hope of the Diocese that EthicsPoint will assist in the protection of all who interact with the parishes, schools, chancery and other diocesan agencies. EthicsPoint accepts reports of financial misconduct through its website or Hotline: 1-888-325-7863. A complete report will be made to diocesan leadership, so that leadership may review and provide feedback and resolution for the issues that are reported.
