

NOTE FROM OUR PASTOR



Last weekend I preached at all Masses about how in the Church there has always been a tension between orthodoxy and orthopraxy. Orthodoxy is right beliefs and



orthopraxy is right practice. It is a necessary tension or a necessary balancing act that we have had to do ever since the beginning of our Church. In some areas, it leans one way and, in some areas, it leans the other way. The Church hierarchy tend to lean heavily on orthodoxy. Often priests or lay people and even religious orders hold up orthopraxy as the other way. In fact, the Franciscans have been known for holding orthopraxy as what they call the "alternate orthodoxy." They defend it as deeply biblically rooted theology not merely words or thoughts but actions that speak to our faith, that witness to our faith.

Pope Francis has taken up this very balancing act. He has even taken the name "Francis," a tipping of his hat to where he is leaning; orthopraxy. He has said time and time again that we need to be a Church that goes to the existential periphery to meet the people where they are: The broken, the wounded, the orphans of today, the refugees, the immigrants, etc. We need to be a Church of the poor he says, a field hospital.

At Holy Spirit Parish, we have taken orthopraxy very seriously. Over these years we have done great work. This weekend, we will have 62 parishioners going to San Augustine to serve others throughout East Texas; the poorest of the poor. In the summer, over 100 people will go to Nicaragua; and we will help build waterways, kitchens, chicken coops and whatever else they need. And we have hundreds more go to the Sacred Heart services, San Jose every month and other outreach ministries.

It is one of the reasons why our Holy Spirit parish community remains so alive; because we have orthopraxy. It is what we have become known for. It is not just orthodoxy as in right beliefs, but right practice and people feel the community behind that. People are attracted to the community because they believe our community does the right thing for the right reason. And I think that is attractive. You, as a community, are attractive because of the right practice.

Last weekend, we began the Annual Diocesan Appeal! One of the right practices is to give to the Annual Diocesan Appeal.

The right practice is that every family give something to our greater Diocesan family because with great gifts comes great responsibility. And we have been blessed in this community; and you are blessing one another but we are also blessing the rest of the Diocese.


If every family could give a little, it would not be difficult for us to meet the goal. I ask you to prayerfully consider it. We are known for our **orthopraxy** and for the good and the righteous works that we do in the name of the Church. Please make this one of the right practices, to give to the ADA. Thank you.

LIVING THE LITURGY

Sacrament of Anointing of the Sick



Why do we need the Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick? We need this because we are prone at times to sickness, both of body and of the soul.

This Sacrament is one of the Sacraments of Healing, i.e. hoping and trusting God that He restores our health, our former vigor or stamina, giving us the recovering strength. As Pope Francis said this sacrament "allows us to touch God's compassion for humanity." He continued, "Each time that we celebrate this Sacrament, the Lord Jesus, in the person of the priest, comes close to the one who suffers and is seriously ill or elderly.

But most of all, it heals the sickness of our souls which is sin. "LORD, heal me, I have sinned against you (Psalm 40:5)." "Is anyone among you sick? He should summon the presbyters of the church, and they should pray over him and anoint [him] with oil and the prayer of faith will save the sick person, and the Lord will raise him up. If he has committed any sins, he will be forgiven (James 5:14-15)."

Remember, as Pope Francis said, it is Jesus Himself who comes to relieve the sick person, to give strength, to give hope, to help; and also to forgive sins.

Please invite your family and friends to our celebration of the Sacrament the weekend of **February 22-23** at all Masses.

PARISH AND DIOCESAN ACTIVITIES

Layette Ministry



The layette ministry continues to provide complete layettes to the Public Health Nurses of Santa Clara County each month. These layettes consist of a quilt, fleece throw, afghan, three receiving blankets, a dozen disposable diapers, package of wipes, a fleece sleeper, three gowns, three sleep/play suits, three onesies, 3 pair of socks, five bibs, 2 pacifiers and a sweater set. The families and single mothers the Public Health Nurses serve are low income, many low educated and with an increase exposure to crime, drug use and domestic violence. The donations we provide help the infants born in these environments with warm blankets and clean new clothes and helps the mothers feel someone really cares.

The Public Health Nurses thank us for our dedication and continued support. We also donate our blankets and other baby items to the annual Diocesan Layette Celebration which is held in December and Sacred Heart Community Service's layette program.

We currently have fourteen members who sew, knit and crochet quilts, afghans, fleece and receiving blankets, sleepers, gowns, sweaters, caps and bibs. There are items we have to purchase to complete the layettes: diapers, wipes, socks, sleep/play suits and onesies. Contact Roberta Zoller at raz990@att.net for more information.
